The Poetry of Erosion

Geologic forms are beautiful.

Combine writing and science by asking your students to pick a picture from the Erosion Power Point Presentation, or from the brochure of a National Park in the Southwest (Bryce, Zion, Arches, Capital Reef) and write a poem about it.

Ask them to describe the colors, size, texture of the rock, and anything else that stands out in free verse. Ask them to consider what the rock might have been originally, how it might have changed, what it will end up being.
